

MONSTER MASH PARTY! Print 'Make your own Monster' sheets onto different colours of paper, cut them out and slue them to a poster. Have everyone Sather round and add bits together. Cut out bits of faces from magazines for added weirdness.

SHAPES GAME! Cut shapes out of coloured paper... geometric or just weird and wonderful. Use the 'Bits and bobs' sheet to turn the shapes into unusual creatures.

Any shape can turn into a monster!

PIN THE EY EBALL ON THE MONSTER!
The rules work the same as the traditional party game, 'Pin the tail on the donkey'.
