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How to use this book



This book contains ten different Reading tests for Year 2, each containing SATs-style questions. As a whole, the complete set of tests provides broad coverage of the test framework for this age group. Each test comprises a reading text followed by comprehension questions. The texts cover a wide range of subject matter across the three key areas: fiction, non-fiction and poetry.

Some questions require a selected response, where children choose the correct answer from several options. Other questions require a constructed response, where children write a short or extended answer of their own. Guidance on the different question types and the skills needed to deal with them are covered on pages 48–53 and 61–62.

A mark scheme and a progress chart are also included towards the end of this book.

Completing the tests


- It is intended that children will take around ten minutes to complete each test; however, timings at this age are not strict, so allow your child as much time as they need.
- After your child has completed a test, mark it and together identify and practise any areas where your child is less confident. Ask them to complete the next test at a later date, when you feel they have had enough time to practise and improve.

Question types

Reading



Multiple-choice questions

Multiple-choice questions usually require children to find facts within a text. They don't ask for opinions. These questions can ask children to tick a box next to the answer they think is correct or put ticks in a table to show if an answer is true or false.

Tips

In order to answer these questions correctly, children should:

- Read the instruction text carefully to ensure that they tick the correct number of options: for example, does the instruction say *Tick* **one** or *Tick* **two**? If they tick too many or too few options, they may not get the mark.
- Read all the possible answers, find the relevant information in the text, and check each possibility before deciding on a final answer.
- Use key words from the question to help them locate the part of the text most likely to have the information they are looking for.
- Carefully cross out any answers they have ticked in error.

How to help your child

Identify, with your child, the key words in multiple-choice questions and scan for these key words in the text.

Read through all answer options out loud with your child, before they answer the question.
