٥	Mark scheme for Grammar and Punctuation Test I						
Т	Award I mark if 'cautiously' is underlined. Grammar essentials: An adverb can tell you more about a verb. It can say how something happens. Remember, not all adverbs end in 'ly' and not all words ending in 'ly' are adverbs!						
2	Award I mark if 'Mum and I wanted to go to the cinema but it was fully booked.' is ticked. Grammar essentials: Co-ordinating conjunctions such as 'and' and 'but' can link two words, phrases or clauses together as an equal pair.						
3	Award I mark if 'Dad took me only last week in fact.' is ticked. Grammar essentials: The simple past tense tells us about a completed event or situation in the past. The second option, 'I have been many times in the past.' is an example of the present perfect tense.						
4	Award I mark if 'an' and 'a' are circled. Grammar essentials: A determiner indicates whether a noun is specific/known, for example: 'the' or more general/ unknown, for example: 'a' or 'an'.						
5	Award I mark for all three correct: imperfect, mistreat, inadvisable. Grammar essentials: A prefix is a string of letters added to the beginning of a word to turn it into another word. It does not alter the spelling of the word it is joined to. Adding some prefixes to a word forms its antonym, a word that is opposite in meaning.						
6	Award I mark for the addition of one word in the same word family. For example: 'supermarket', 'superman', 'superstar'. Grammar essentials: A word family is a group of words that share the same root.						
7	Award I mark if 'We watched our team play – it was high time they won!' is ticked. Punctuation essentials: A single dash can mark the boundary between independent clauses.						
8	Award I mark for correct positioning of inverted commas: "Why don't we invite Gran for dinner?" asked Michael's mum. Punctuation essentials: In direct speech, inverted commas come at the beginning and the end of the spoken words.						
9	Award I mark for the word 'it'. Do not accept a capitalised 'i'. Grammar essentials: A pronoun can be used to replace a noun, noun phrase or proper noun. It aids cohesion and avoids repetition.						
10	Award I mark if 'Dad said he might take us to the park.' is ticked. Grammar essentials: A modal verb, for example: 'might' goes before another verb to show how certain something is.
