Animals of the Arctic

<p>These migrating animals are travelling north to find food and give birth to their young in the long Arctic summer.</p>	<p>For example, the bowhead whale, the long-tusked narwhal, and birds such as bar-tailed godwits and snow geese travel thousands of miles, while herds of caribou trudge just a few hundred.</p>
<p>Polar bears, musk oxen, Arctic wolves and foxes manage to survive the extreme cold of the long, dark Arctic night.</p>	<p>When the summer is almost over and the six-month Arctic night begins, the migrating animals start their long journeys home.</p>
<p>While they are there, the sun shines night and day, helping plants to bloom across the Arctic tundra.</p>	<p>These plants provide food for insects and small creatures, which then become food for bigger animals.</p>
<p>However, there are other animals living in many different parts of the world who migrate to the Arctic every year.</p>	
<p>This food chain means that all the animals have enough to eat and raise their young.</p>	
<p>Even though the Arctic is extremely cold, some animals can live there all year round.</p>
